

Easter Brownie Bites

For the perfect sweet treat this Easter, why not rustle up a batch of these super easy Brownie Bites? The recipe below makes approximately twenty-four.

Ingredients

- 175g butter, chopped
- 150g dark chocolate
- 250g light brown soft sugar
- 85g self-raising flour
- 50g cocoa powder
- 3 large eggs, beaten
- 100g milk chocolate chips
- 24 mini chocolate eggs, plus extra to decorate

Method

Step 1

Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Line 24 holes of a mini muffin tray with paper cases. Put the butter, dark chocolate and sugar in a pan and heat it very gently, stirring all the time until the butter and chocolate have melted. Remove from the heat and leave to cool for a few minutes.

Step 2

Sift the flour, cocoa and a pinch of salt into a large bowl. Stir in the warm, melted chocolate mixture and the beaten eggs, then add half the chocolate chips and mix until combined.

Step 3

Divide the mixture between the cases and place a mini egg into the middle of each muffin, pushing down gently. Bake for 12-15 minutes until cooked but still gooey in the centre. Leave to cool for 10 minutes in the tin before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.

Step 4

Melt the rest of the chocolate chips in short bursts in the microwave, stirring

frequently. Dot a small amount on each cake and stick on some more mini eggs.



Step 5 Eat and repeat!

John Woods Hospital

John Wood, the Founder of Wood's Hospital, was descended from Admiral Sir Andrew Wood of Largo. He spent his youth in Largo before an absence of more than half a century, which included time as a member of the Royal Households of King James VI (James I of England) and King Charles I. Upon his return, he was able to purchase Monturpie Farm and adjacent ground in Upper Largo. In 1659, two years before his death, John Wood instructed that a hospital be built solely for old men who shared the Wood surname. The original building, by Robert Mylne of Edinburgh, had 14 rooms, each containing a bed, a closet and a loom. The first residents took up their places around Candlemas 1667. Rent from the farm helped to keep the hospital.

In 1830 a "tremendous and destructive" flood caused enough damage for the building to be written off. The replacement building was designed by civil engineer James Leslie, son of Largo architect-builder Alexander Leslie. The two-storey Jacobean style building has thirteen bays arranged in a 3-3-1-3-3 symmetrical pattern and was made from stone quarried at Keil's Den. The accommodation was described as "fitted up for sixteen inmates, each having a sitting and a sleeping apartment. In the centre is a large hall, where they are convened to prayers morning and evening; above which is a room for the meetings of the patrons."

Each resident had a monthly allowance and a share of the garden and was encouraged, if able, to undertake tasks Instead of a picture...

Unfortunately, there seems to be no drawing of the original building. Here is a brief description of it from the diary of Mr John Lamont of Newton (factor to the Lundin family of Lundin).

1665, Apr. About the begining of this monthe, the Hospital att the Church of Largo in Fyffe, appointed to be buelded by the deceased John Wood, was founded at this tyme, by Robert Mill, measter measson in Edb., and some men that he hyred for the worke About the end of Au. 1665, the rooffe was put on this building, and slaited and glassed. It consisted of thrie rooffes; one to the east, one to the north, and one to the west. The entrie of it looked to the south.

around the grounds. In 1950 the building underwent significant modernisation. Oil lamps and gas light were replaced with electric lighting. New indoor conveniences replaced old toilets at the rear. By this time, there was no longer a requirement for residents to share the surname of the founder and any pensioner living in the neighbouring district could apply for residence. Further renovation was carried out in 1975, following the sale of Monturpie farm. A few years later, several sheltered houses were built within the grounds. John Wood's Houses (as it is now known) is a supported housing complex, comprising 15 bungalows and 8 flats, for people over the age of 55.

Largo Parish Church Wall



Largo Kirk has a historic wall built by John Wood in 1657. There is a booklet about the Church and it has this note:

The Diary of Mr John Lamont of Newton 1649-71: 1657 - In April the measons began to build a stone dyke about the church yarde of Largo. It was built at the expense of Johne Wood, sometime a Courtier, one of the house of Largo; it stood him about £50.

A tablet in the wall above the disabled access ramp commemorates his gift and reads

"A.D. 1657. After fifty-five years absence, returning from his travels, caused build this wall about this churchyard in memorie that his predecessors and his parents lyes buried in Largo iylle" - John Wood, Esquire Tablet restored, 1897.

Two Old Photos of Largo

The photo at the right shows the top end of Harbour Wynd before Keilburn was built in the late 1970s. The former District Nurse's cottage [far right] was built on Largo Road, behind the war memorial. Note the deep dip in Harbour Wynd at its junction with Largo Road. This was filled in during the construction of Keilburn.





On the left is an aerial photo of Lower Largo. It was taken in the post-war period when they were building the Station Park area – so probably 1946-47. At the top-left is the row of cottages, shown above. The fields occupied by Keilburn, Toll Court and Station Park are now completely built-up. The light field on the right is still unoccupied in its upper half.

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Committee Meeting, 1666

The original Wood's Hospital was built following a bequest by John Wood, who died in 1661. During the planning and construction, several meetings of the 'Patrons & Administrators' were held, some in Edinburgh, others in Largo. Here is the bill for one of them:

This information comes from a book *The East Neuk of Fife*, by Walter Wood (1812 – 1882), minister of Elie. It may be consulted in the Library.

Dollars & Pounds

The prices given in the previous article were in pund Scots, which were eventually (1707) declared to be 12 to the pound Sterling. What I found interesting was that the expenses were quoted in dollars.

When I was at school in the 1950s, a dollar was common slang for 5 shillings. At the time, it was believed to be derived from the US\$, which had been for several years 4 to the pound; which meant that \$1 was worth 5 shillings.

Looking at this bill, I realised that dollar must have been in common usage in the 17th Century. Shakespeare, of course, knew this: in Macbeth, Act 1, Scene 2, he has Ross say ... disbursed 10,000 dollars to our general use.

So what was the 1666 dollar? A little internet research shows that it was a coin, first issued by James VI (called the Thistle Dollar), worth 3 pund Scots. Which, by 1707, would have been valued at ... 5 shillings Sterling.

Largo Pier Subgroup Report

We hope you all enjoyed reading Largo Pier: Past, Present and Future which was circulated with the last edition of Largo Links. We have received a large number of favourable comments and may consider a further print-run should there be demand. We are now progressing with the Technical Design phase of the work to restore the Pier. This involves the full specification and takes us up to the issuing and receiving of tenders for the work. This phase should be completed by the end of 2023. Progress from there onwards is entirely dependent upon us obtaining large-scale grant awards. We

have submitted an application to the Levenmouth Reconnected Programme and expect a decision in late March/April. Further applications are being made to Historic Environment Scotland, the Community Ownership Fund and the National Heritage Lottery. We can only hope that we put forward a good case which warrants the granting of funds. We still intend to have some open events when you will be able to tell us of your ideas for the future of the restored Pier more details of these in the near future.

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


Spitfire Fund

Largo set up its own Spitfire Fund Committee in October 1940, the *Leven Mail* of 16 October reported that:

A splendid start was made in the campaign when whist drives were held in Montrave Hall and Newburn School. There was an attendance of about 200, and Mr. Binnie acted as cardmaster. The prizes, most of which had been gifted, were handed over by Mrs Anderson, Glenairlie. A large number of gentlemen present were Polish soldiers, who made their presence felt by carrying off all the prizes in the men's section.

Contributions could be sent to the National Bank in Lundin Links or to the committee treasurer, Mr John Adamson. Events up to the start of December raised over £165. By the time that the fund was closed in February 1941, £289 8s 6d had been forwarded from Largo to the overall Fife fund.

Tolls

In 1872, there was a toll between Largo and the station, and another between Largo and Lundin Links ... They paid 1s for a carriage and pair of horses, 6d for a cart and one horse, and 4d for a riding horse ... "It was an awful nuisance, especially coming home late, after the toll-keeper had gone to bed, and we had to knock him up and he took a long time to come, sometimes."

In 1883, the roads were taken over by the Road Trust, and tolls were stopped.

This information comes from the *Largo Village Book* (1932). It may be consulted in the Library.





How the Poor were Maintained

In 1836, the average number of poor persons receiving aid was 12, and the average sum allotted to each was £1 15s 5d. The annual amount of contributions for relief was £28 16s. The proportion of this sum arising from church collections was £13 3s 8d, and from other funds, £15 12s 4d. There was then, says Dr Laurie, little disposition from the poor to refrain from seeking relief. The days when application for such relief was reckoned degrading had long passed away.

Local Place Plan Update



Largo Communities

community group open days. By inviting all businesses large and small in the area, we were able to build a picture of what the needs and offers of business people are. This will inform our plan moving forward. We were joined by Jeremy Harris of the Fife Coast and Countryside Trust who gave us a great talk on the widereaching work and vision of the Trust. Among other things there was a desire expressed for more collective promotion of the Largo Area identity and more working together which has already started to happen as well as the development of other working relationships.

We are looking to wrap up our work on drafting a local place plan by mid-year. We have reached a few general consensus main issues which will also be firmed up.

- The local area has a high level of pride. In addition, the villages are friendly and cooperative.
- On the whole across all age groups people hold the unique natural spaces, culture, and heritage of the Largo Area very dear.
- Largo Arts Week and the Pier Restoration project have shown the community's pride and support.
- In the Community Life Survey (2015), 'belonging' ranks extremely high in the Largo Area and we found this strongly mirrored in our survey.

- We are rich in community spirit: A variety of people with spare time, skills and resources are willing to contribute to projects.
- The Largo Area is home to many community halls, groups, and volunteer-led hubs.
 Gilston Hall, LACRT, Largo Links magazine, Hatti group, Largo Library, and Warm Welcome are a few of them.
- Additionally, there are many fun and varied activities.
- There is also recognition that the Largo Area has a number of high-quality venues, shops, cafes and hotels that add value.

There is a cross-generational interest in increasing accessibility and making it easier to walk, cycle, and use a wheelchair to get from one place to the next.

- Would improve connectivity between the area and Leven, as well as the East Neuk.
- A pathway between New Gilston and Woodside is necessary.
- There is no speed limit on the road that connects the villages currently, making it unsafe for walkers and families.
- Lower Largo needs Changing Places & Toilets. Access for beach wheelchairs should be looked at as resources for the disabled.
- There is an unsafe pathway between Lower and Upper Largo.
- A few Largo Area villages lack resources and amenities. Community-led facilities make up for this, but we should preserve, value, and protect them.

These aren't all the possible issues and topics. There's too much to cover in a short summary. Our deeper dives will help us develop a comprehensive plan that will preserve, improve and protect the locality of Largo for a long time to come.

Celebrating Seasonal Fife

We are so fortunate to live in Fife. It is a microcosm of Scotland as a whole, and when it comes to our raw produce, we have it all! More importantly we can also follow the seasons with our produce and make the most of what we grow here. By sourcing, preparing and cooking our own produce, not only are we looking after our economy, by supporting local business, we are also helping to reduce food miles and wastage. Ultimately of course we are helping ourselves, the health benefits of eating food that has not travelled far is well-documented.



So what to look for in March and April

All the root vegetables will still be available, but look out for purple sprouting broccoli, young kale and some salad leaves. Rhubarb is also available.

Roe deer is available and this wonderful wild, lean meat makes not only good eating but it is also helping to protect the countryside, as deer have no predators and we need to keep them under control to protect arable crops.

Mackerel start to be abundant again and is an inexpensive fish with a wide variety of ways it can be prepared. But why not visit your local fish supplier and simply ask what have you got? I could plug my own fish cookbook here!! But it is worth remembering that wild fish has its season, so look out for such fish as Hake and Coley.

From the wild try making soup with nettle tops and wild garlic is just beginning to emerge, it makes a superb pesto in place of basil or you can buy it made by local company Trotter's independent.

For fish try Lowrie's or G and J Wilson in St Monans

For game try Ardross, St Monans and Balgove Larder, St. Andrews

Daniel Defoe

Daniel Defoe is best known, of course, as the author of *Robinson Crusoe* but was also famous as a political pamphleteer, and is often called the father of modern journalism. He was born as Daniel Foe in 1660, but used the grander-sounding 'Defoe' as his pen name. He was pilloried and imprisoned in 1703 for a pamphlet he wrote satirising High Church Tories. He later wrote pamphlets for both the Tories and the Whigs. His novels also included *Moll Flanders*. His three-volume travel book, *Tour Through the Whole Island of Great Britain*, was published between 1724 and 1727, and was innovative partly

because Defoe had actually visited the places he described. He died in 1731.

While in prison, Defoe had written to William Patterson, the Scot who founded the Bank of England – and who was the part-instigator of the Darien Scheme. Through Patterson, he contacted Robert Harley who

became Queen Anne's Secretary of State, the de facto Prime Minister of England. Harley in due course arranged for Defoe's release in order that he should work for him. In 1706, Defoe was ordered to Scotland:

You are to use the utmost caution that it may not be supposed you are employed by any person in England ...

You are to write constantly the true State how you find things, at least once a week ... You may confidently assure those you converse with, that the Queen & all those who have Credit with her, are sincere & hearty for the Union.

You must shew them this is such an opportunity that being once lost or neglected is not again to be recovered. England never

was before in so good a disposition to make large Concessions ...

Defoe's feelings were mixed - troubled by the pro-French ethos that persisted north of the border, he was also attracted to a country in which his fellow Presbyterians were not oppressed. He came to feel that union would not just help Scotland economically, but would be good for Protestant England facing threats from the continent. As a Presbyterian, he was accepted as an adviser to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland and committees of the Parliament of Scotland.

By mixing with the people of Scotland,

Defoe was able to pass back to London comments that would not make it back through more formal channels.

Among his first reports to his English masters, he said that: A Scots rabble is the worst of its kind ... Years later John Clerk of Penicuik, a leading Unionist, wrote in his memoirs that it

was not known then that Defoe was reporting to England:

... to give a faithful account to him from time to time how everything past here. He was therefor a spy among us, but not known to be such, otherways the Mob of Edin. had pull him to pieces.

The powers in London feared a rebellion among the common people. Such an insurrection could throw up leaders that were not so open to persuasion through titles and honours as were the Scottish nobles they were currently dealing with; the men that Robert Burns would later characterise as *A parcel of rogues*.

Lundin Links Hotel

The Liquidator has given the Community Council no information and no risk assessment was carried out, despite warnings from the Fire Chief. It is felt that Scottish Water did not give a satisfactory reply to the Community Council's concerns over the local water supply although Peacehaven now has an extra tender if required. Following the enquiries about high volume pumps, the Fife Brigade let us know that it is a specialised vehicle costing £1/4 Million and there is one in Central Scotland. Mr Aitken will ask for a meeting to suggest to The Scottish Government, should there not be at least two High Volume Pumps to cover Fife. Perhaps Jenny Gilruth MSP can get a result.

Bathing Water

An update meeting was held on the 18th of November with Jenny Gilruth MSP, Scottish Water, SEPA, Mr Aitken and Mr Allan. Scottish Water stated that intense water sampling had taken place over the summer and it was hoped to have the testing finished by the end of November and they are now assessing the results, which will take some considerable time. SEPA reported that samples had been taken from the bay next to the Keil Burn, Temple Burn and Strathairly Burn. The samples showed high levels of E.coli bacteria with the Temple Burn showing consistently high levels. It is thought to be predominantly from human source and it was suggested that it was from pipes going into the bay rather that from the burns.

Next steps - There is a statutory requirement from SEPA to display 'poor' classification which will be presented at the start of the next bathing season. Fife Countryside Trust will erect this poster on the beach notice board with the summary of the classification.

Scottish Water was asked what their ideal plan for reducing the level of E.coli bacteria in the bay was and the suggestion was to put in secondary and tertiary treatment.
